# After cancer, AYAs can look to a variety of groups for financial help.

# THERE ARE MANY GROUPS that offer financial help to people with cancer who are having trouble keeping up with their medical and

everyday expenses.

It can pay to seek out disease-specific patient advocacy groups, some of which offer grants. In addition, most pharmaceutical companies have patient assistance programs that offer medications at discounts or free to patients who are financially eligible; call the companies that make your medicines and ask how to apply to these programs. Finally, there are many nonprofit organizations that offer financial help to patients regardless of cancer type. Here is a list of some of them.
